In GCSE history you will study:

- Germany, 1890–1945: Democracy and dictatorship.
- Conflict and tension between East and West, 1945–1972.
- Britain: Health and the people: c1000 to the present day.
- Elizabethan England, c1568–1603.

What skills do I need?

Why study history? Everyone considering GCSE history should think about this question. It is reasonable to expect that anyone studying history has an interest in the past – but that should not be the only reason.
